# **Stories of Impact: Faulkner County Council on Aging**

Homebound, food-insecure seniors continue to count on the Faulkner County Council on Aging for meals, through their Meals on Wheels program. An elderly woman has been receiving meals on wheels for about 4 months now. She was diagnosed with malnutrition, weighing less than 80 pounds. She was recommended to do physical therapy but was too weak to do it.

All because of the Meals on Wheels program, she is now able to do more day to day activities. She gained 15 lbs and was able to start doing physical therapy to help live to her full potential. She is meeting more of her goals slowly but surely. One of her goals is to be able to come attend activities at the Senior Center in person. She is confident this will happen and cannot wait to see what else she can accomplish, simply because of the encouragement and opportunities she has been given.

Because our United Way funding is used to match federal grants, we are able to amplify our reach to help senior adults like her remain healthy, active, and independent to enhance their quality of life.

Bingo Nights are held quarterly to benefit our mini grants. These mini grants are given to fund local non-profits in our area.






The mission of the Call is to educate, empower, and equip Arkansas Christians to provide a future and a hope for children in foster care in Arkansas.

## Free Counseling Gives Survivors a Path to Healing

### **Stories of Impact: Rise House**

At Rise House, we know that healing from domestic violence goes far beyond finding physical safety. Survivors often carry invisible wounds like anxiety, depression, PTSD, and deep emotional scars that require compassionate, long-term care. That's why, in response to the overwhelming need for trauma-informed counseling, we launched our mental health program to provide free services to the individuals and families we serve.

What started as a vision to offer holistic, wraparound support quickly became a lifeline. Last year alone, 83 clients received free, individualized mental health care through our program. For many, it was their first opportunity to talk to a licensed

therapist, process years of trauma, and begin the long journey toward reclaiming their sense of self. This critical program wouldn't be possible without the support of United Way of Central Arkansas.

Through the Health and Wellness grant, we're able to purchase vital therapy supplies, healing-centered curriculum, and resources not just for mental health counseling, but for the life skills and support groups that surround it. From therapeutic workbooks to calming tools for grounding exercises, every item funded plays a role in our clients' recovery. We believe healing should be accessible, comprehensive, and rooted in dignity, and thanks to United Way, we're making that belief a reality.

### **A Community Effort** — **Tax Help for Those Who Need It Most**

**Stories of Impact: Vita Tax Prep** 

The Vita Tax Preparation program is a community effort. Community volunteers conduct intake for families served to ensure that all needed information is present. Accounting majors at the University of Central Arkansas prepare tax returns for underserved families in Central Arkansas. Over four hundred families have been served through this program and more than \$75,000 dollars have been saved in tax preparation fees!

# Hope in Motion: A Community's Answer to Crisis

### **Stories of Impact: Conway Ministry Center**

A family walked through the doors of the Ministry Center in a moment of deep need. With their young son battling for his life in the ICU at Children's Hospital, the parents were forced to make a painful choice: pay their utility bill or keep their car filled with gas to make the daily trip to be by his side. They turned to the Ministry Center for help, and after a careful assessment by a case manager, a community alert was sent through Charity Tracker — a tool designed to connect people in crisis with a network of organizations ready to help.

Before the day was over, something remarkable happened. The utility bill was paid in full, and several organizations came forward to provide gas cards, ensuring the family could stay close to their son without worrying about financial obstacles. Because of United Way's funding of Charity Tracker, the family can now focus their energy on what matters most — loving their son and cheering him on in his fight. It's a powerful reminder that when a community comes together, hope can conquer even the greatest struggles.
